

Letter from the Minister

My Dear Friends

William Shakespeare commented that "We are time's subjects...", (Henry IV, part 2) and once again I have to say (with feeling!) that I think he had a point. Certainly, that went through my mind as I sat down (again) to write (yet another) letter for the magazine!

My last letter began referencing Bob Dylan's comment that "the times they are a-changing", and most of you will be aware by now that this is as true in the Church of Scotland as it is everywhere else. We held a congregational meeting to bring you up to speed with the proposed changes which would, in time, affect us if the Presbytery approve the proposed Plan. At the Presbytery meeting, on November 15, the draft Plan was approved: it now makes its way through various other groups (the General Trustees; Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group, or PMPIG; Faith Nurture) for agreement. If it is approved by all, then, as we told you at the meeting, the Plan will come into "play" on January 1 2026. Given how quickly time passes, that is sooner rather than later. You will find an article with more information later in this magazine, and you may also receive a copy separately – rather like Advent ducks, it's good to have two! Please read this (these?) carefully, and if you have any concerns, please <u>ask</u>.

However: it is the start of Advent as I write this, and you will by now have heard my annual whinge at the desperate measures taken by the secular world to overlook this time of preparation in their desire to get us all out there "spending". I recall once reading a definition of "advertising" that ran something along the lines of "persuading people to buy things they don't want, with money they don't have, to give to people to don't need them", and perhaps there is a touch of truth in that. On the other hand, the contributions to the Food Bank we collected on Advent Sunday demonstrated that many people are incredibly generous when it comes to helping those far less well off – so not all advertising is necessarily bad – even if it is a moot point as to whether it is right that sixth richest country in the world should need food banks...



Food Bank donations on November 27 2022 weighed 117.4kg, the largest amount we have ever had. Thank you.

In my Advent sermon, I found myself referring to John Betjeman's poem Advent 1955 (once again): in it, he offers a "prod" to the reader to reflect on what the event we prepare for during Advent is really about. Is it about serial spending, over-consumption, shortened tempers and over-busy Advent markets? Or is it about reflecting on the fact that our faith is predicated upon the awesome reality that God became one with us, as one of us, and shared the full human experience in Jesus of Nazareth, in some extraordinary way, so that we might be given the greatest gift of all: light, which expels all darkness.

Shakespeare also wrote (in the same play) "...every minute now should be the father of some stratagem. The times are wild...": let this Advent, occurring as it does against a tempestuous global backdrop, be a time we use wisely and well, as we prepare to celebrate with joy the birth of our true King, Saviour, role model and friend.

Veni, Emmanuel O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear.

O come, thou Dayspring, come and cheer our spirits by thine advent her; disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadows put to fligh: Rejoice ! Rejoice ! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

May God bless, guide, comfort and keep you, this Advent and Christmas.

The Presbytery Plan

Introduction: for clarification

" 'Follow me.' These words echoed through the introduction of the Radical Action Plan to the General Assembly of 2019. The Church of Scotland realised that substantive changes were required in order to share Christ's message to the people of Scotland against the backdrop of fewer ministerial posts. Radical reforms were proposed and these continued into the General Assembly of 2021. The Presbytery Mission Plan Act (Act VIII/2021) required each Presbytery to configure itself in order to focus fully and faithfully on mission. Within a context of rapid change and straitened resources, especially of ministers, this Assembly also agreed that the Presbytery of Edinburgh should be allocated 48.5 ministry posts and the Presbytery of West Lothian 17 ministry posts in order to fulfil its missional calling. Moreover, each Presbytery was asked to present a Mission Plan by December 31 2022 which set out the manner in which its mission would be pursued, ensuring that every parish in Scotland was faithfully served by the Church of Scotland." (From the Working Document of the Edinburgh & West Lothian Presbytery Plan 2022)

Congregational Meeting

A meeting of the congregation was called on November 13 to update them on the latest plan for the re-organisation of churches and ministries throughout the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian. At the Presbytery Meeting on November 15 the proposed plan will be discussed and voted on and the overall Presbytery Plan will either be accepted or rejected.

The Situation

Nigel Hicks, our Presbytery elder, presented a PowerPoint illustrating what lies ahead within the Church of Scotland. In part the need for urgent change is driven by the lack of candidates coming forward for the Ministry of Word & Sacrament, the ageing profile of serving ministers, and the contraction of membership and resources. The Deployment Group proposed to Presbytery a three-way union between St Anne's, St Ninians and St Andrew's, this having been explored by representatives of the three churches. Currently, this group has two FTMWS (Full Time Minister of Word and Sacrament), both on unrestricted tenure, and one vacant charge. We have three sets of buildings: churches and halls, all designated as 'A', and three manses.

<u>The Plan</u>

In the published plan, our three-way union has been allocated 1 FTMWS and 0.5 MDS (Ministry Development Staff). While we consider this to be inadequate to fulfil our Mission Plan based on the Five Marks of Mission (see below), that is what would be put to Presbytery on the 15th. The plan is due to be implemented by January 1, 2026. It should be noted that if ministers/congregations with unrestricted tenure currently do not wish to proceed, the proposed union will be deferred until such time as the existing minister(s) demit office, when formal conversations will begin. Change will, however, happen and opportunities will be sought for our congregations to work more closely together as we go forward.

The Vote

Nigel asked for guidance on how he should vote on behalf of St Anne's at the Presbytery meeting on Tuesday November 15. A vote was taken with a large majority voting for accepting the plan.

Five Marks of Mission:

1 To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom;

2 To teach, baptise and nurture new believers;

3 To respond to human need by loving service;

4 To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation;

5 To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth. To summarise: Tell, Teach, Tend, Transform, Treasure.

Presbytery Meeting of November 15: The vote took place and the Plan was duly accepted.
