Letter from the Minister

My Dear Friends,

Well: I began my last letter (October) with the observation that, during my holidays, we had acquired a new organist, prime minister and King; and this letter is written as we welcome yet another new prime minister to Westminster (I'm tempted to say, "blink and you miss them"!).

I am, by now, weary of making the observation that we live in turbulent times, politically, socially, nationally and internationally. Often, I find myself humming a song by Burns, which includes the prayer: "That Sense and Worth, o'er a' the earth Shall bear the gree an' a' that."

It is a sentiment that I suspect we all share.

We are affected by change, and so much of it feels beyond our control: this is as true in the Church of Scotland as in politics and society. The Presbytery of Edinburgh & West Lothian will shortly be voting on the draft plan which, if approved, will significantly change how church is "done" in our area over time. Other presbyteries are going through the same process. It is unsettling, and feelings are running high.

As people of faith, we should not lose courage in such times, because the life of faith is not about building walls, creating barriers or founding institutions – at least, it shouldn't be! All the stories we read in our services, or when we read our Bibles at home, show this, because they are always about change – change when God touches people's hearts and lives, literally breaking them free from fear and doubt. Another verse that frequently runs through my mind:

So be it, Lord; thy throne shall never, like earth's proud empires, pass away; thy kingdom stands, and grows for ever, till all thy creatures own thy sway.

As we prepare for the journey of Advent, and the new Church year, which begins on November 27, may we pray for courage to persevere, wherever we are, whatever we are called to do, trusting that God's grace and love will strengthen us, his Spirit will sustain us, whatever we may face. And who knows, perhaps in time sense and worth may indeed "bear the gree' o'er a' the earth".

This last book, a second by Victoria Hislop, knocked *Conclave by Robert Harris* out of our top ten by four votes. Interestingly, almost half the books read received a vote and a further seven books received a mention but were not allowed as ten had already been chosen by the voter.



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


